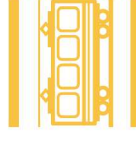
Taxi

Food & Drink

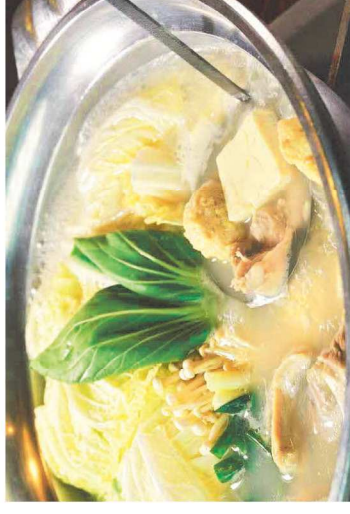

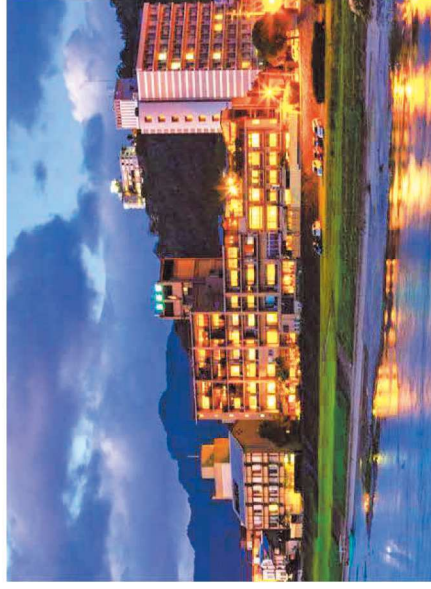
Kokura Castle

This famous castle was built by Hosokawa Tadaoki in 1602 and is distinctive for its castle tower built in the “karazukuri” architectural style where the 5th floor is larger than the 4th. It was renovated in 2019 to feature a theater introducing Kokura Castle history and an observation zone offering a 360° view of the town of Kokura.



Harazuru Onsen

Harazuru Onsen extends alongside the Chikugo River. Its name derives from being discovered when cranes were seen bathing in the hot spring on the dry banks of the Chikugo River. There are many attractions to enjoy throughout the four seasons in addition to the onsen, including cherry blossoms in spring, cormorant fishing and Kyoho grape-picking in summer, and fall colors and persimmon picking in autumn.



Cruising downstream on Yanagawa River

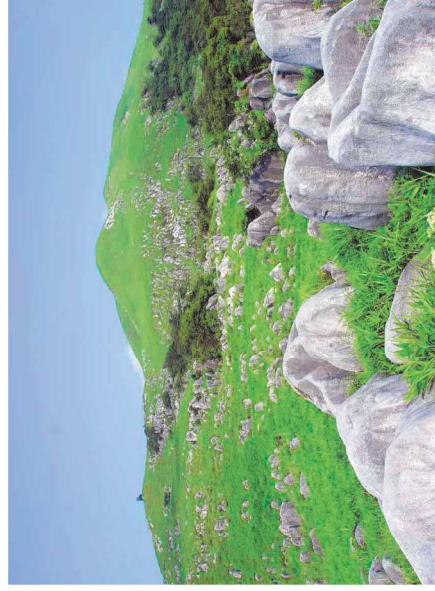
In the richly ambient castle town of Yanagawa where you can still find “namako” walls and storehouses, waterways crisscross through the town to create beautiful riverside scenery. Visitors can take a “donkobune” boat for a leisurely ride down the river.



Hiraodai

Hiraodai, one of Japan's most notable karst plateaus, is home to an estimated 200 limestone caves. Its distinctive landscape is characterized by countless white limestone formations scattered across the grasslands, resembling a flock of sheep, earning it the nickname "Sheep Field." Both the surface terrain and the underground cave systems are designated as a National Natural Monument.

Hiraodai is also a renowned caving destination, offering guided tours suitable for beginners. Equipped with headlamps, adventurers can journey into the darkness of the caves, experiencing a thrill unmatched by commercial caves. The beauty of Hiraodai continues year-round, with controlled burns in spring, lush greenery in summer, and fields of golden pampas grass in autumn.



The Kyushu National Museum

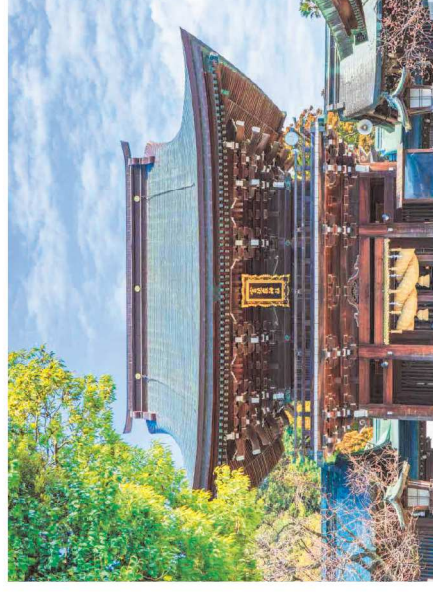
The Kyushu National Museum, Japan's fourth national museum, distinguishes itself with its focus on the historical development of Japanese culture within a broader Asian context. Unlike other national museums that primarily feature fine arts, this museum highlights the evolution of Japanese culture, emphasizing the region's close historical ties with other Asian nations. The museum houses a significant collection of Important Cultural Properties and hosts popular special exhibitions centered around specific themes. The Cultural Exchange Exhibition showcases a rotating display of 800 to 900 artifacts, illuminating the influence of Asian interactions on the formation of Japanese culture. The "Ajippa" exhibit offers a hands-on experience of traditional attire, everyday objects, toys, and music from various Asian countries that have engaged with Japan throughout its history, providing an engaging and immersive experience for visitors.



Miyajidake Shrine

Miyajidake Shrine is revered for its blessings of good fortune and prosperity in business. Its most striking feature is the enormous three-ton Shimenawa (sacred rice straw rope) hanging before the main hall, which is replaced annually by the dedicated efforts of 1,500 volunteers.

From the top of the stairs, visitors are rewarded with a breathtaking view overlooking the shrine path, extending to the distant city and sea. Twice a year, in February and October, the setting sun aligns perfectly with this path, creating a magical "Road of Light" phenomenon that draws crowds of admirers.
